Theatrical attempts at paradigm shifting are all too often hamstrung by an earnest and medicinal tone. In recent years the dominant culture has been lucky enough to have had the white comfort-zone rug tugged from under it by clever, funny people such as *Master of None's* Alan Yang and Aziz Ansari. What you are about to see by Chinese-New Zealand writer and performance poet Nathan Joe takes a similar approach: upending perspectives through fast and witty entertainment that is as unafraid of inviting laughter as it is of delivering punches.

Described in one review as a 'theatrical mosaic', this unique work is a powerful and affecting series of moments that accrue to something much greater than their sum. It begins from minute one, with the opening unrehearsed questions offering jeopardy and sincerity in equal measure, while also gently introducing the performers we'll be watching not as characters, but as themselves. What follows – dynamism, truth-telling and disarming humour – frequently catches us off guard. It's the stuff that starts conversations, and even nurtures change, one audience member at a time.

We truly believe in the power of the arts to help us step into another's shoes, and so are very proud to present this work by The Reaction Theory. I encourage you to make the most of the glossary of terms provided by the producers in the hope of supporting a shared language as you watch this production and to take with you. Our special thanks to the artists and creatives involved, for giving so much of themselves to this meaningful and impactful work, and for starting conversations that can continue well beyond the theatre.

Nathan Joe (he/him) is a Chinese New Zealand playwright (2021 Bruce Mason Playwriting Award) and performance poet (2020 National Slam Champion). He was the Creative Director for the 2023 and 2024 Auckland Pride festival. Other accolades include winning the Playmarket b425 award two years in a row (2015 and 2016) and being shortlisted for the ADAM NZ award three times. His most recent work includes Losing Face (2023) and A Short History of Asian New Zealand Theatre (2024, 2025). Later this year, he will be joining the Michener Center for Writers to pursue his MFA in playwriting.

Born in Aotearoa (New Zealand), Chelsea August is an award winning Theatre Maker, Performer and Producer; dedicated to creating bold, thought-provoking work. She holds a Fine Arts degree in Drama from QUT and is passionate about initiating diverse conversations in intimate settings. Chelsea's recent credits include working alongside La Boite Theatre, Queensland Theatre, Belloo Creative, and Australian Theatre For Young People (ATYP). Recently, she co-directed and produced the New Zealand script Scenes From a Yellow Peril, which went on to win Best Independent Production and Best Ensemble at the 2024 QLD Matilda Awards. Now making her mainstage debut, Chelsea's creative practice focuses on the execution of performance making; crafting intimate audience experiences that transport viewers into new worlds, provoking reflection on societal, cultural, and dramatic themes that resonate beyond the theatre.

Egan Sun-Bin is an up and coming Theatre Maker who has worked in main-stage and independent companies such as Queensland Theatre, La Boite, and Playlab. Recently, Sun-Bin has worked as associate director for the 2024 production of The Peasant Prince and has won a Matilda Award for the Queensland Premiere of Scenes From a Yellow Peril. As a playwright through initiatives with Australian Plays Transform (Untold Stories Retreat) and Australian Theatre For Young People (Roomworks and Fresh Ink Mentoring Program). Alongside Chelsea August, Sun-Bin acts as one of the creative leads for The Reaction Theory. As a community activist, Sun-Bin has previously worked in various Asian spaces as Brisbane Longhouse Coordinator for Contemporary Asian Australian Performance and works to advocate for performers as an Organiser for the Media Entertainment & Arts Alliance.

Jess Bunz is a Producer, Director, and Theatre Maker originally from Aotearoa. She has worked with many theatre companies across Brisbane, including La Boite Theatre, Queensland Theatre, Shake & Stir and Dead Puppet Society. Jess is currently the Senior Producer at La Boite Theatre, where she facilitates their mainstage season, artist development programs, and youth and education offerings. She has previously produced for the QLD Youth Shakespeare Festival and the Festival of Australian Student Theatre. In her creative practice, Jess is a co-founder of The Naughty Corner Collective, where she directed their sell-out season of MAZE at the Brisbane Powerhouse. She has worked across both mainstage and independent projects in a directing capacity, and is also a Teaching Artist, leading workshops for Queensland Theatre and La Boite. She has also led La Boite's Assembly program for the past three years. Jess is overjoyed to be back in the room with the Yellow Peril team, and can't wait for audiences to witness the brilliance of these artists!

Petria Leong is a Magandjin based stage manager dedicated to creating inclusive, sustainable and impactful theatre. She holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Technical Production from Queensland University of Technology (QUT). Working as a stage manager, Petria has learnt to be versatile within the theatrical production space and strives to ensure each production is a reflection of both artistic excellence and environmental responsibility. Her recent credits include working alongside Scenes From a Yellow Peril (The Reaction Theory, DOOR3 QT and QPAC), The Astral Plane (Queensland Theatre), Jean Paul Gaultier's Fashion Freak Show (Brisbane Festival) and Slow Boat (Brisbane Festival, Brisbane Powerhouse).

Katrina Irawati Graham is an Indonesian Australian writer, director and dramaturg working in screen and theatre. She creates in many genres including feminist horror, crime and drama. She is twice ADG nominated for her direction on STAN Originals drama series Bali 2002. Her Indonesian ghost story, White Song, is part of Australia's first all-female directed horror anthology, Dark Whispers (SBS). Katrina has adapted a feature script of her supernatural play, Siti Rubiyah, with Screen Queensland support. She has written two award winning online crime series and has been in writers' rooms for ABC and SBS. She embeds cultural safety in all aspects of her creative practice. Katrina is also in demand as a speaker and facilitator who supports deep conversations, community connections, and strong creative outcomes. Cultural safety clients have included Queensland Theatre, La Boite, QUT and Endemol Shine. Katrina is represented by BMEG.

In her time she has worked on a diverse range of stage and screen, including most recently, her mainstage debut with *Pride and Prejudice* (Queensland Theatre), Breaking (Metro Arts), The Wolves (QUT), The Trial (Queensland Theatre), Much Ado about Nothing (Shake & Stir), Lucky, Lucky (Griffith) and two regional tours of The Scene Project with Queensland Theatre. Daphne has additionally won a Matilda Award with her fellow castmates for Scenes From a Yellow Peril, winning Best Ensemble.

Chris Nguyen is a Matilda Award-winning, Vietnamese emerging Brisbane based actor. He is a 2023 graduate of the Queensland Conservatorium Griffith University's Bachelor of Acting. He made his mark in independent theatre in Reaction Theory and BIPOC Arts Australia's production Scenes From a Yellow Peril (2024) as a part of Queensland Theatre's inaugural Door 3 program. He is an award nominated actor in short films such as Otter and Fox (2022), and Spit of You (2023), as well as partaking in University productions such as: As You Like It (2022), Festen (2023) and Oresteia (2023).

Jazz Zhao is a Matilda Award-winning actor of Chinese descent. Her latest film and TV credits include AACTA
Nominated Best Short Film And The Ocean Agreed (2024), Nine Network's The Actually Really
Very Difficult Show, and Stiffs.
She has worked with mainstage and independent companies such as Playlab, Dead Puppet Society and La Boite. Notably, Scenes From a Yellow Peril has been her fondest achievement to date.

Jazz aspires to contribute to theatre that impacts people and changes perspectives regarding BIPOC and issues close to her heart. She hopes to create work that leaves the world a more understanding, compassionate place. Her writing debut *Make Me Better Ma* is being developed through an Artist Residency at BACKBONE.

She teaches piano at her home studio, frequents the stand-up comedy scene and is an avid collector of pot plants. She is currently represented by BMEG. Peter Wood is a proud Queer, Indonesian Australian actor and performance-maker. Peter recently won Best Ensemble and Best Independent Production with Scenes From a Yellow Peril (The Reaction Theory, BIPOC Arts Australia) at the 2024 Matilda Awards. After a successful season under Queensland Theatre's Door 3 program, Scenes From a Yellow Peril has made its mainstage debut at QPAC. Peter recently performed as Pythio (Alternate) and Ensemble in Head Over Heels with That Production Company. Notable credits include, A Night With The Villains, Wondered (Mira Ball Productions), We Will Rock You, A Chorus Line (A Coastal Theatre Collective), Stranger Sings!, Young Frankenstein, Grease (Millennial Productions), MAMMA MIA! (The Show Co.), And She Would Stand Like This (Antipodes Theatre Company), Sunny Tribe District (Robert the Cat/Metro Arts), and Once On This Island (Altitude Theatre). From their work on screen to theatre, Peter strives to represent authentic queer and Asian-Australian characters and their stories.

Briana Clark is an Asian Australian, Matilda nominated Lighting Designer and Stage Manager, based in Magandjin. She graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Technical Production. Her niche is creating bold and experimental lighting designs, especially for contemporary circus and dance. Ultimately, her ambition is to uplift BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ voices, and to be involved with political, feminist art. Alex has also designed sets for productions and installations at Brisbane Fringe Festival (TITS AKIMBO's Sexfest), Anywhere Festival (Lunch Friend's 34 Scenes About the Weather) and most recently worked on the Bluey's World interactive experience as a Props and Set Specialist. Alex has quickly developed a fascination for the impact set design can have on storytelling in theatre and film and is always excited for opportunities that will allow her to explore and experiment with the form further. Alex has a Bachelor of Fine Arts (Film, Television and New Media) from QUT (2022).

Imperfect Creatives is an artist-focused production company and education provider based on Queensland's Gold Coast. Founded in 2020 by industry professionals tired of artists being mistreated and overlooked, Imperfect has quickly become a trusted name in the South-East Queensland acting and production communities.

Leading the design is co-founder Jack Alfred Kelly, a camera operator, photographer, and production designer. After studying at the University of Southern Queensland, Jack joined the team at the Seven Network, shooting and editing news for their flagship state bulletins. Since then, he has produced over 200 episodes of documentary television, designed lighting, sets and video for stage, built a studio, and created marketing content for theatre and entertainment companies.

Colonisation	A violent, extractive system of domination that uses a false narrative of superiority to steal land and subjugate people
Chink	Offensive slur to label a person of Chinese descent
Geisha (芸者)	Female Japanese performing artist
Konichiwa (こんにちは)	Japanese term for 'hello'
Arrigato (ありがとう)	Japanese term for 'thank you'
Gweilo (鬼佬)	Cantonese term for Westerner
Feng shui (風水)	An ancient Chinese art that involves strategically arranging spaces to allow for proper energy flow that aligns with natural forces
