Queensland Museum

Come explore Queensland's vibrant First Nations cultures in a fun, interactive workshop for our littlest learners!

Sing, dance, and move with purpose to explore Australia's native animals, from the majestic Green Sea Turtle to the mysterious Tawny Frogmouth, and uncover the powerful connections between animals and First Nations cultures. Get up close with Queensland Museum Kurilpa's native specimens to deepen your students' understanding of cultural identity, Dreamtime stories, and celebrate the creatures that guide us. This workshop is designed for Kindy to Year 2. Early years learners will connect with animals featured in Queensland Museum Kurilpa's Wild State exhibition.

- 1. This workshop promotes cultural responsiveness and environmental awareness. Students will engage in activities that develop skills such as listening, creative movement, observation, and sharing.
- 2. Cultural Connections Explored in the Workshop:
 - **Cultural and Spiritual Significance:** Animals play a central role in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander creation stories (Dreamtime or Dreaming).
 - **Totemism and Kinship:** In some Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, individuals or groups are linked to specific animals, plants, or natural elements through totemism.
 - Knowledge of Animals and the Environment: Indigenous peoples possess deep knowledge of local animals
 and their behaviours, passed down through generations, including their habits, habitats, diets, and migration
 patterns.
 - Animals in Dreamtime Stories: Dreamtime stories often feature animals that influence the landscape, weather, and social norms.
- 3. The workshop will address questions such as: What is it? Habitat? Life cycle? Food source? Cultural connection?

SUGGESTED PRE- AND POST-LEARNING ACTIVITIES

Pre-Preparing students for the museum visit:

Extension activity from the workshop:

- In groups, students identify their favourite Australian animal and mimic its movements. Encourage students to learn about their animal through sounds and pictures.
- 2. Then, ask students to focus on their group's animal tracks and footprints.
- 3. Finally, encourage students to record their own footprints.

Further activities

- 1. Get in touch with the community connect with parents, elders, or cultural centres, and have a yarn.
- Read storybooks on Dreamtime stories. For example titles, visit the Children's Picture Books section at the AIATSIS Shop or your local library.
- Reach out to animal conservation groups, national parks, and nature reserves to learn more about your local animals.

Extra resources

Respecting First Nations Art in the Classroom

When sharing First Nations artworks with children, it's important to be respectful. Here are some simple steps to follow:

- Ask First Talk to local Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people before using their art or stories.
- Respect Who Owns the Art First Nations art belongs to the people who create it. Don't copy or change it without permission.
- Different Groups, Different Art Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have many different cultures and art styles. Teach children that not all First Nations art looks the same.
- Be Careful with Symbols Some patterns and designs have special meanings and shouldn't be used without asking.
- Celebrate and Learn Help children enjoy and lean about Australians Beautiful Frist Nations Culture. Acknowledge and celebrate significant First Nations dates throughout the year.
- 6. **Learn** from First Nations art in a way that honours the people and stories behind it.
